Meet faculty and explore areas of interest. Introductory courses help students develop critical thinking, communication, and leadership skills.	<b>Develop research skills</b> and start exploring research opportunities. Talk with faculty and career services about future internship opportunities.	<b>Explore internships</b> and work with faculty to find a summer opportunity related to museums, historic preservation, archeology, law, etc.	Hone research skills; practice synthesizing and presenting research. Produce original research under the guidance of history faculty.
Join in History Club and other departmental activities. Get involved with other clubs and organizations related to your research and career goals.	Pursue leadership roles within History Club, apply for a desk in the undergraduate office, volunteer at local museums and libraries.	Participate in community outreach events such as History Day. Apply for research opportunities such as <b>Wentz</b> , <b>undergraduate conferences</b> , <b>and AURCA</b> .	Continue to pursue research opportunities and leadership positions. Engage with institutions related to career interests.
