OSU Geographers were busy working and playing in San Francisco late last month. Besides their many poster, paper, and panel presentations:

- Colton Flynn was the winner of the Gail Hobbs Student Paper Competition sponsored by the Geography Education Specialty Group (GESG). His paper was titled "An Experiential-Based Learning Method Aiming to Improve Spatial Awareness."
- Jordan Brasher was elected to one of two graduate student representative positions on the Cultural Geography Specialty Group (CGSG) board.

Thomas Craig has been awarded the 2016 E. Willard and Ruby S. Miller Geography Education Research Grant from the National Council for Geographic Education (NCGE).

Amanda Weber has been extended a conditional offer of employment from the National Geospatial Intelligence Agency (NGA). She has tentatively been selected for an intelligence position with a focus on human geography. She plans to finish her PhD before moving on to the position with NGA.

Carlos Cordova was the featured speaker for the 8th Annual "Plants, People & Beyond" Lecture on April 8 at the Edmon Low Library. The series is hosted by the Oklahoma State University Library and Department of Plant Biology, Ecology and Evolution each spring. Carlos gave a presentation titled "Crimea: Environmental change from the ancient Greek Colonies to the Putin Era" based on his recent book *Crimea and the Black Sea: An Environmental History*.


