## **Graduate College Awards**

The Department of Geography was well-represented at the Graduate College Awards Ceremony on Wednesday, April 24 in the Student Union.

**Colton Flynn**, graduating with his PhD in Geography this semester, collected several prestigious awards:

- Named <u>Honorary Commencement Marshall</u>, one of only two PhD students per commencement chosen. This is the highest honor bestowed on Doctoral and Master's degree graduates at each commencement. Marshals receive a monetary award, are recognized at commencement, and lead the graduates in the processional and recessional.
- Received a <u>Research Excellence Award</u> representing Group IV (only one PhD and one MS per group). This program recognizes graduate students for their outstanding research accomplishments as reflected in their thesis or dissertation. Awardees receive a certificate, a Presidential Letter of Commendation, and commemorative plaque.
- Received a <u>Doctoral Student Phoenix Award</u>. This is the highest recognition bestowed by GPSGA on an OSU doctoral student and recognizes exemplary achievement in leadership and scholarship, community and university service, and professional involvement, especially as it relates to the OSU graduate student body. The student award winners each receive a monetary award from the GPSGA.

PhD candidate **Ben Hemingway** shared the inaugural Oklahoma State University Holistic Science Prize, in which CAS doctoral students are recognized for multidisciplinary, interdisciplinary, or holistic research contributions. Winners receive \$2,000, a certificate, and a nifty lapel pin.

PhD candidate **Puja Jana** served as a Graduate College Ambassador for a second year. Ambassadors are volunteers who are passionate about OSU, excited about their graduate student experiences, and eager to share their insights with future graduate students.

A reception after was held in the student union.

As part of this funding from ConocoPhillips, we were able to award the inaugural **ConocoPhillips GIS Certificate Enhancement Scholarship** for \$1,000 to undergraduate major Diane Johnson.

## **More News From Around the Department**

The Geography Department was involved in the signing of a memorandum of understanding between Oklahoma State University and Kazan Federal University (Tatarstan, Russia). The signing took place at the School of Global Studies and Partnerships on April 17, 2019. Signatories included Dean Randy Kluver for OSU and Dr. Ayrat Sitdikov and Dr. Ramil Karutdinov for KFU (below, right).

Present from KFU were Leonid Vyazov and Julia Salova (below, center). **Drs. Carlos Cordova** and **Alyson Greiner** were present at the signing ceremony (below, left).

The partnership includes exchanges of students and faculty as well as collaboration in courses abroad, including Russian language courses.

That same day Dr. Leonid Vyazov gave a lecture at the Geography colloquium. The lecture covered a study of archaeology and geoarchaeology of the forest-steppe region of the Middle Volga Region, a project in collaboration with Carlos Cordova.



## **Conservation of Stillwater Resources**

On Friday evening and Saturday morning of April 26-27, students in Bays' Conservation Dr. Brad of Natural Resources class (GEOG 3053) met at Stillwater's Sanborn Lake to donate about 25 man hours of their labor to collect refuse from the trails and lake's edge. The mess was collected, photographed for assessing types of litter and likely sources, sorted into recyclables and nonrecyclables, and disposed of properly. Sanborn Lake, which is located just east of the Stillwater airport, was constructed during the early 1920s as



Thomas Lake Park. For most of the 20<sup>th</sup> Century it was the base of one of the most active chapters of the Izaak Walton League, a conservation organization established in 1922. For the last two decades the lake has been the annual site of the Sanborn Lake Nature Camp, a children's educational day camp dedicated to instilling science-based environmental awareness through hands-on experiences with wildlife, insects, reptiles, fish, and natural

ecosystems.
